Director's Report

Nabakrushna Choudhury Centre for Development Studies , as the only social science research institute of Odisha was established in the year of 1987 and thus, by the end of 2014-15 it has completed its 26th year of existence. It has been rendering its valuable services towards development of the state in manifold ways with special reference to research and policy formulations since its inception.

It gives me immense pleasure to present herein the annual report on the academic and financial activities of the institute for the year of 2014-15. With small number of research staff, this year as usual, was an academically hard but eventful year. In this year the institute has completed four important external funded projects. Three books were published by the academic staff of the institute and as many as 14 number of research articles were published by them.

The institute has hold 14 seminars on different research issues , one orientation programme on the labour problem in association with V.V.Giri National Labour Institute , Noida , one training/ workshop programme on All India Survey on Higher Education, two lectures; one on Nabakrushna Choudhury Memorial Lecture series and the other one a guest lecture . Apart from all this the faculties have participated in as many as 32 outside seminars, workshops, training programmes etc.

One ICSSR Research Fellow was awarded Ph.D. degree and three have submitted their theses for evaluation. More over two post-doctoral Fellows have also submitted their theses for examination .

In this year the much needed and awaited workstation; 'Centre for Census Studies and Application' was established by the Census Operations, Government of India, within the campus that helps the entire academic mass to avail very vital micro level data at its doorstep. This certainly expedites certain specific research projects of the institute. This station remains opened in all working day throughout the year for the use of public researchers.

Another important academic unit that has been set up within the campus of our institute is: State SIA (Social Impact Assessment) Unit by the Revenue and Disaster Management Department , Government of Odisha , that aims at conducting of social assessment studies as per the provisions under the Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition Rehabilitation Act 2013. Moreover the AISHE State Unit which was established in 2011 by the Higher Education Department ,Government of Odisha for All India Survey of Higher Education, has hold a number of programmes in 2014-15.

Professor R.K.Panda completed his three-year term as the full time Director of the institute and was relieved from his duties in this year. Another person, namely Shree Mukund Kissan, OAS(I) remained as the I/C Director of the institute until I joined on 11.09.2015. Now I, in consultation with the staff have formulated a technical 'Vision-Plan' called 'Blueprint' with clear-cut ideas on how to take up the institute to a greater height at the national and international levels. The initial formalities are now on the process and I hope that once the basic infrastructural problems including filling up of the faculty positions are sorted out the centre would run efficiently and achieve the goals under the aforesaid 'plan document'.

I. Overview

Nabakrushna Choudhury Centre for Development Studies, as an autonomous inter-disciplinary social science research institute, was established in March 1987 under the joint initiatives of the Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR), Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India and the Higher Education Department, Government of Odisha. It is registered under the Societies Registration Act - 1860.

It functions with the financial support from the Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR), New Delhi and the Government of Odisha on a matching basis and it is

managed by a Board of Governors constituted by the Government of Odisha. The members of the Board of Governors comprise eminent academicians, Government administrators and nominees of the Government of Odisha and ICSSR.

Initially it ran for few years in a rented building and now it has its own campus in the institutional area under RRL Post Office, Bhubaneswar. By the end of 2014-15, It has completed its twenty sixth year of existence in Odisha.

II. Objectives, Thrust Areas of Research and Activities

a) Objectives

The main objectives of the Centre are to:

- Undertake research on socio-economic problems of the State of Odisha and India as a whole and to provide appropriate policy measures .
- Promote field-oriented empirical research strongly rooted in theory under social science disciplines.
- To Assist the State Government by undertaking systematic studies relating to socio-economic development such as assessment and judicious utilization of natural resources, land, forest, water, minerals etc; identification of factors retarding the growth and development of the State economy; micro and macro level perspective planning and modern development paradox relating to environmental pollution, involuntary displacement, marginalisation of the weaker sections, regional imbalances and the like.
- To provide academic, advisory and consultancy services to the Government of India, Government of Odisha, international development agencies, educational institutions, corporate bodies and others on their request.
- To conduct training programmes for the State Government Officials associated with the planning and implementation of various development programmes at different levels.
- To organise training programmes for the doctoral research scholars, social scientists and the NGOs to improve their research skills.
- To organise, seminars/workshops, study circles, working groups/parties and conferences with a view to develop and enrich social science research in Odisha state at the micro and India at macro level.

b)Thrust areas of research

Since its inception, the Centre has built up a tradition of inter-disciplinary as well as a liberal research policy wherein it is decided not to impose a unitary research agenda from top to the bottom. This has encouraged research in diverse areas according to individual interests of faculty members. These are broadly classified as follows:

- **Sustainable Use and Management of Natural Resources** – Forest, Minerals, Agricultural Land, Cropping Diversification, Water Bodies, Irrigation Infrastructure etc.
- **Studies on Different Aspects of Poverty and its Eradication** – Magnitude and Causes of Poverty, Evaluation of various Anti-Poverty Programmes, Social, Cultural, Economic, Ecological and Political Aspects of Poverty, Intervention Measures, Contributing Factors of Poverty, etc.
- **Natural Disasters and Sustainable Development** – Studies on Flood, Drought, Cyclone etc. and their Preventions, Coping Mechanism and Loss Minimization
- **Studies on Social Sector Development** – Targeting Access to Minimum Basic Needs for the Poor and Excluded Population, Strengthening of Public Health Care Services, Primary and Basic Education, Potable Water, Sanitation, Shelter, Social Security Measures and the like.
- **Studies on Traditional Industries and Informal Sector** – Handloom, Handicrafts, Informal Manufacturing and Service Sector Economy.
- **Labour Market and Migration** – Causes and Consequences of Distress Migration, Pull and Push Factors of Migration, Labour Market Characteristics, Employment-Unemployment Scenario.
- **Tribal Economy, Ecology and Society in the Development Process** – Involuntary Displacement, Development Projects, Pauperization and Marginalization, Problems of Development Mainstreaming, Assimilation and the like.
- **State Finance in Development Perspective** – Resource Mobilization Strategy, Prevention of Leakages, Targeting Public Expenditure for Inclusive Development.
- **Studies on Development Problems of Marginalized and Excluded Sections of the Society, viz. SC, ST and Women** – Social, Cultural and Economic Exclusion Process,

Deprivation and Discrimination, Gender Equity, Social Justice, Reservation and Affirmative Action, Empowerment, etc.

- **Industrialization and Urbanization Problems** – Mineral-based Industries and Displacement Problems, Resource Exhaustion, Industrial Pollution, Slums, Urban Poverty and Housing Problems, Mega Cities and Urban Planning, Industrial Growth , Decentralized Development, etc.
- **Environment, Ecology and Sustainable Development-** Mega Projects- Dams, Irrigation Projects, Thermal and Hydro Power Projects, Mineral-based Industries such as Iron and Steel Industries, Aluminium Industries and the like.
- **LPG (Liberalization, Privatization, Globalization) Model of Development and its Impact on the Economy/Society/Polity**
- **Evaluation and Baseline Studies** - Anti-Poverty Programmes, Child Labour Elimination, Flagship Programmes - NRHM, NUHM, PMGSY, TLC, SSA, MGNREGA, Social Security and Special Welfare Schemes for SC/ST and Women.
- **Good Governance** – Prevention of Corruption, Crime, Black Money, Resource Raising Efficiency and Allocation, Efficient Policy Planning and Delivery Mechanism.

With an interdisciplinary theory and empirical approach, the institute has played a very decisive role in enriching development related social science research in the state. Before the setting up of this institute, Odisha did not have adequate coverage of its economy, society and polity in social science literature. There were very few research articles available in peer reviewed and professional social science journals dealing with the state of development of economy and society in Odisha. However, after the establishment of this institute in 1987, social science research in the state got a new lease of life.

c) Activities

All the activities of the Centre are related to its aims and objectives. However, the main activities of the institute are as follows:

- Conducting of research studies in the field of social science subjects on different aspects of policy formulations and development;

- Providing consultancy services and professional assistance to the government and public institutions in formulation of plans and programmes on specific issues they ask for ;
- Conducting of seminars, workshops, conferences, training and monitoring programmes;
- Providing guidance to the doctoral and post-doctoral scholars for their respective works .

III. Infrastructural Facilities

The institute is located in a prime locality of Bhubaneswar city in a closed compound of five acres of land provided by the government of Odisha. It is having three separate two storey buildings meant for different purposes. One is the main office building, one is the Library building and the rest one is the Hostel- cum- Guest House.

The main office building is having separate cabins for the faculties. It has a well furnished Conference Room, a Seminar Hall, and a computer section having two Computer Cells. The main research activities of the institute are carried out in this building. Here the administrative section is also present. Apart from all these, in this building three external research based units are also situated. These are mentioned as below:

i) SIA (Social Impact Assessment) Unit.

It has been set up by the Revenue and Disaster Management Department, Govt. Odisha. NCDS acts as the State Coordinating Agency for this unit.

ii) ‘Workstation – Centre for Census Studies and Application’ Unit

It has been set up in collaboration with Directorate of Census Operations, Government of India. NCDS acts as the State Coordinating and Data Resource Agency for this unit.

iii) AISHE Unit

It is established by the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of Odisha. NCDS acts as the State Coordinating Agency.

The library building was inaugurated in the year of 2010. It is a well planned building with distinct facilities for the readers.

As an integral part of the Centre, the library has been playing a very significant role in supporting research activities of the Centre, augmenting both print and electronic resources and providing fast and efficient services to the researchers. It provides various types of specialized services .It has got an exclusive collection of books, journals, reports, reprints, dissertations, theses, working and other research papers, on-line databases on various social science subjects.

The total book collection of the library is 15,549. During this period, library has acquired 439 books. Presently, the library is subscribing 84 journals, out of which 64 are Indian and the rest 20 are foreign journals. This library is a member of ICSSR e-resources consortia for JSTOR. It is the trusted digital repository for long-term preservation and access to leading academic journals and scholarly materials from around the world. Library is also subscribing Indiastat.com and Ebsco online database which provide comprehensive socio-economic statistical data on India and its states.

IV. Staff Position

Apart from the Director, during the year the Centre was having only five faculty members, comprising two Readers, two Sr. Lecturers and one Research Associate. The strength of research supporting staff was confined to three. The library was having two staff members comprising one Librarian and Library Attendant. The computer section comprised only one person with the post of Asst Programmer. There were nine administrative staff and the number of subordinate staff was ten. VII. Establishment of SIA Unit

The Revenue and Disaster Management Department, Govt. of Odisha, has set up the State SIA (Social Impact Assessment) Unit at NCDS in the current year for conducting Social Impact Assessment studies as per the provisions under the Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act 2013.

After the formation of the unit, Prof. R. K. Meher, Professor of Industrial Sociology has been entrusted by the authority to work as the Coordinator of this unit. The first four studies relate to the land acquisition for MGR Corridor and Water Pipeline Corridor of 40000 MW UMPP in Sundargarh area covering districts such as , Samabalpur, ,Jharsuguda , and Sundargarh. The other studies relate to acquisition of land for widening of two-lane road to four –lane road from Bankibahal to Kanika railway siding in Hemgir Tahasil of Sundargarh District and the other one for land acquisition for Astarang Port Corridor covering Niali, Kantapara and Barang tahasils of Cuttack district .

VIII. Establishment of The Workstation – Centre for Census Studies and Application

In this year the Workstation, ‘Centre for Census Studies and Application’ was established by the Census Operations, Government of India, within the campus of NCDS, especially on the first floor of the main office building where the library of the institute was running earlier. This workstation helps the entire academia in manifold ways. This certainly expedites certain specific research projects of the institute and others. This station remains opened in all the working days throughout the year for the use of public researchers. Dr. Sibalal Meher acts as its Coordinator.

IX. AISHE Unit

This unit develops the data base for the Higher Education Department, Government of Odisha. In this year AISHE unit conducted one training programme and, Dr (Mrs) Rashmi Mishra, as the State Co-ordinator of this unit attended seven outside seminars / meeting- cum-workshop held under this programme.
